FROM THE PASTOR.....

"There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus." Galatians 3:28

Some time ago I recall seeing a picture on FaceBook of a person with many tattoos and piercings all over their face. The person who posted it asked, "What is your reaction to this person?" I wasn't surprised by the responses of people who chimed in. They said things like "he needs counseling, he seems really troubled, he needs God." I guess it's a natural human reaction to judge someone by their appearance. How do we know he's not more together than most of us? My first reaction was, I'd like to meet him. I bet he has an interesting story to tell.

Our God is a welcoming God. Jesus did not turn people away because they were poor, sick or had a different belief system. It did not matter their age, where they came from or where they were headed. He did not love based on gender, their culture or looks. He did not turn people away. He said that the greatest way to live was to love God and love our neighbor. If Jesus is our example, then hopefully we seek to be more like him. I hope we can widen our love for others and work at doing it better.

Whether we welcome friends to our home, visitors to our church or just say hello to a person on the street, maybe we can display the welcoming attitude of God's love for all the world.

As a church, one of the main focuses this year has been an effort to seek ways to widen our welcome. Our Community Meal now welcomes students from CV who help support this ministry. We now include a time for singing and prayer with our community friends. Our Food Pantry has widened its base of clients and has stepped up and is offering more food and a greater variety. In the last year we supported Frank Crouch, a man in recovery. He was part of our church life, we offered rides, visited him in the hospital, grew with him at Bible Studies. Our Reconciling Team has worked for months, studying, praying and interviewing church folks to seek to gather ideas how we can be a friendlier church. Some ideas we have implemented, others are in process.

In February we are offering some chances to gather around this subject to help us move forward in faith. I am asking you to be part of this effort. Let's come together and put the time into this chance to study, talk and pray together. Come to the study, come to the dinner. I am putting time aside to help us in this work and I invite you to join me. (The themes of worship in February will all center around ways we can welcome others.) Pick at least one of the opportunities to help grow the church and widen our welcome.

If you are up for it, join the "Freeze Out 5K to End Homelessness" at Highland Park on 2/28.

Throughout 2019, our church donated 16 cell phones to survivors of domestic abuse. If you have an old cell phone, please drop it in the basket across from the mailboxes. It is stripped of your information but usable for people who feel threatened to dial 911. We also donated 49 pairs of glasses to the Lions Club that distributes them worldwide. Way to go church: it's another way to make a difference in the community and world.

Our "Mittens & More Tree" was a great blessing to Calvin Coolidge Elementary School. The staff members were overwhelmed with our generosity. The tree netted 6 scarves, 12 pairs of mittens, 25 pairs of gloves, and 23 pairs of socks, 3 pairs of leggings, 5 hat/mitten sets, and 25 hats. Mission & Outreach team and individuals also donated enough to add 20 pairs of leggings or sweat-type pants, more socks & underwear & <u>16 pairs</u> of sneakers.

The Ballard's Christmas Pajama Project for the children of the Wyoming Conference Children's Home (WCCH) was a huge success! There were plenty of pajamas to go around on Christmas Eve.

Church members joined us to Christmas Carol on the 22nd of December. We visited church people who are shut in and others in the neighborhood. We gave out little bags of hot chocolate & candy canes with invitations to Christmas Eve services.

The Food Pantry has transitioned to a comprehensive plan with items from the Food

Bank of the Southern Tier including fresh foods. Folks pick food items of their choice. We still need more volunteers for one hour on Mondays (4-5 or 5-6 PM). Can you give one hour a month or so?

Our Community meals (3rd Thursday 5-6 PM) and Ugly Quilts (every Monday 2:30-4:30) continue to serve the community and give our volunteers new connections and friendships! We laugh and have great fellowship. Please join us whenever you can drop in.
