We have re-opened the **Food Pantry**. Thanks to your generous support of the pantry we were able to place a big order for food. (We filled every refrigerator and freezer in the church!) Many have come by (now out of work) and appreciate our offering of food. We have also been able to give them homemade masks for each family member.

Our **Blessing Box** by the bus stop is a hit! This is a Box containing food that people can access day and night. With the help of the Boy Scouts, Susan Button and Lori Barbeisch, Michelle Purdy, and Amanda Yates, we have been filling the Box with food about every other day.

We have continued to offer **virtual worship** on Facebook that can also be accessed on our Website. We have many people viewing from both near and far. In the future we hope to find a way to continue this practice for those who may be sick, homebound, on vacation etc. Special thanks to our organist Chanmi Baek, our liturgists and singers, Austin and Emily Claire and Marcia Focht for helping to make this weekly on-line service happen!

There was a **Palm Sunday Road Rally**. (42 cars with 80+ people from 3 different churches) Participants left the parking lot shouting "Hosanna in the Highest." They then followed a designated route, stopping at various places and reading the scriptures provided as they remembered the last week of Christ's life. Many participants responded that it was a very meaningful and moving experience.

We have started "Wonderful Wednesdays" which includes a Zoom Bible Study on Phillipians at 1 PM with Pastor Jan and Bedtime Stories on Facebook at 7 PM read by Sunday School teachers and others. Special thanks to Elizabeth Noonan for coordinating this and to all our readers!

Last week we started **Operation Cookie**. We had many volunteer to bake and drop off cookies to church folks. This sweet treat made for a personal visit (at a safe distance) and a chance to remind them they are loved. Thanks to the bakers: Sue Barton, Ellen Gardiner, Karen Gdovin, Laura and Anne Colman, Cindy Minus, Korin and Jessica Spencer, Myrt Buchanan, and Phyllis Smith.

The Children's Home Preventative Services asked for help collecting diapers and masks. Thanks to Jenn Evans for coordinating this project. They were thrilled when I dropped off hundreds of diapers for needy families and two bags filled with masks. (Thank you Karen Lewis and Pat Kavalesky)

We appreciate the **financial gifts** that have come to the church to support our ministry. Jon Gdovin noticed his co-workers were feeling down one day so he went to the store and brought back Drum Stick Ice Cream Cones for everyone. His refrigerator at work is filled with more and they can help themselves!

Sue Barton took to the road for an alternative celebration on Easter Sunday. She drove 30 miles and greeted 18 people. She called when almost at a home and then beeped her horn when arrived. Friends who came to their door were greeted with a shout of "Christ is Risen!" Many responded with "He has risen indeed!"

Carol Carpenetti, our Administrative Assistant, made several May Day Baskets that she delivered to door handles on May 1st - an old fashioned tradition that brightens up the day. She also supported the Sky Lake Bake Sales by buying cookies and then delivering them to other WUMC members. She said, "It was not about the cookies but the connection with people who are living alone during this time of separation."

I was happy to deliver a snack basket to Hannah Spencer, a nurse working on the front lines in the ICU at Wilson Hospital and a Lasagna Dinner was taken to Michelle Purdy who was working overtime as a pharmacist.

I have been calling people from our church and I know many members are calling and checking in with others as the weeks pass.

In Windsor, Loa Bagg Noyd is singing praise songs from her front lawn on Sunday mornings prior to the church's live stream worship service. Many neighbors come out to join in (appropriately distanced) and she posts on Facebook as well. It is uplifting whether you sing along or just listen!

This week I am feeling rather drained and was pleasantly surprised and energized to find a lovely gift bag on my doorstep... with all sorts of goodies and a card that read, "Hoping to put a smile on your face!" Someone knew I needed support this week and I was smiling from ear to ear! It made my day! (Thank you to the giver!)

I have no idea when we will be together in worship again. When we do re-open we will need to follow some new safety measures. Unfortunately, we will need to "let go" of a few programs, for now, because we will need to maintain a safe distance from each other.

Until we meet again, stay strong, keep the faith and know that God is with you! Also, know that I hold you in my prayers and am so proud of the church that has left the building!!!!

Ever since quarantine began, my husband has been leaving huge tips for workers when we get take out. His generosity has even brought some people to tears. When I asked him why he does that, he said, "We can't keep it all to ourselves. They aren't making a lot of money during these times and they need it." I don't say this to brag, I just mention the fact because it inspires me.

From Jennifer Evans:

We are amid a pandemic. A dangerous virus has forced people out of work, has our most vulnerable individuals confined to their homes with little to no contact with others, and it has closed the church we gather at on Sunday to hear the word of God. We are wearing masks and distancing ourselves from others to protect our loved ones and are careful of every place we go and everything we touch. Some of us have not hugged our family members in months. So where is God in all of this? I will tell you what I have seen.

I have seen people from our community and from other states come together and provide hundreds of diapers for children in need.

Meals, cookies, and groceries are being taken to those that may not otherwise be getting out.

Teachers are going above and beyond to provide children with learning experiences in brand new ways.

Children are creating. Sidewalk chalk art, pictures, cards, and thank you notes to essential workers.

School food service workers have continued to work to make sure that children are fed.

Although we could not have a traditional party, more than 15 cars drove by my home beeping and cheering to celebrate Aariana's birthday. She felt incredibly special that day.

Online communities have been created with people sharing known resources and helpful ideas.

We are reaching out to our loved ones and others through letters and cards.

Church members are making masks and giving them to anyone in need.

We are taking long walks and spending time outdoors taking time to enjoy all that God has created.

Sunday school teachers are reading books to share with our children.

I have seen our pastor and many church members work endlessly to make sure that we are still receiving the word of God through online services and devotionals.

We are together. We are taking care of each other. Loving each other. Gods light is shining, and I pray that through the rain, you see it too!!

Elizabeth Noonan shares:

Since the virus struck I've watched my neighbor deal with an aggressive form of breast cancer, surgery and now chemotherapy, without complaining because every minute she's so grateful to be alive.

I've watched both my son and my daughter lose their incomes, be at first terrified about their futures, and then pull themselves up and do everything in their power to care for their families, keep their own health, and deal with their realities.

I've seen my friends, even some who haven't sewn in years, dust off their sewing machines and make hundreds of masks for those who are otherwise unable to get them.

I've watched some of these same people hand masks to total strangers they meet who can't afford to send for one.

I watch my phone light up several times a day with a text or call, a friend reaching out to say hi, a family member catching up, someone telling me they love me.

I've witnessed our Prayer Messengers literally pray my ill sister onto a plane and across the country to live safely with her daughter.

I've watched multiple angels from our church make and deliver cookies and other gifts to those who are unable to leave their homes. And many more angels just doing incredibly thoughtful things like dropping off care packages and flowers, making phone calls, writing cards and notes, just because.

I've watched many people brave the unknown and teach themselves how to use Zoom, Facebook Live, Facetime, Skype and other electronic means in order to help themselves and others conquer the loneliness we face.

I watched our Pastor find every conceivable way to reach out to our congregation and beyond, including speaking to a camera lens each week, so we can know the Grace of God.

There are hundreds of examples, these are just a few.

This is all Grace. This is all the Grace of God. It is God's grace working through God's people. It is the greatest gift of all in the midst of disaster, and it is how I know God is at work.
