From the Pastor...

But examine everything carefully; hold fast to that which is good.

I Thessalonians 5:21

I have been thinking about habits lately. Habits are small decisions we make and actions we perform every day. According to the researchers at Duke University, habits account for about 40 percent of our behaviors on any given day. We have patterns of behavior that we repeat daily. I make coffee first thing! (It's best for everyone if I do!) I put on my seatbelt as soon as I get in the car. I try to exercise three times a week. I have some great habits and some that are not so great. Do I really need the cheese and crackers before bed? Do I need to pack so much into my day that I compromise my efforts for self-care? Do I burden my loved ones too much with concerns when I could be taking them to God?

What we repeatedly do ultimately forms the person you are, the things you believe and the person you portray. We are creatures of habit! How in shape or out of shape are you? It is a result of your habits. How happy or sad are you? It may have something to do with your habits.

Habits relate to our spiritual life as well. Growing in faith is about nurturing our holy habits. What holy habits have been helpful to you during this pandemic? Have you put some actions into your routine that help you care for yourself or be a better neighbor? I have heard about folks checking on folks down the street and calling relatives who live at a distance. Some shared they have been writing cards, letters and emails. Others related that they have been taking daily walks to clear their minds and pray. When the church was closed and later when folks chose to stay home for safety reasons, many mentioned the habit (and blessing) of on line worship. Personally I have become much more diligent in my morning prayers. I have gotten into the habit of coming early to church on Sunday so I can kneel at the altar and pray before anyone arrives. It is stressful to be a pastor during a pandemic and this habit of centering prayer has made a big difference. What holy habits have helped you to cope?

I am excited to welcome folks back to worship. Each week we have been seeing folks return now that they are getting vaccinated. We pray that as the weeks unfold, others will feel more confident to join us. It is easy to get out of the habit of worshiping in person. The longer you wait to return the harder it will be to get in the habit of coming to church. It's so much easier to tune in when it fits your schedule and you don't even have to leave the house! But it is not the same as worshiping together. Church is all about community. Please consider returning and making this a holy habit worth keeping.

UGLY QUILTS

Good news, Ugly quilters!!!

We can now resume our mission to provide our quilts to the homeless...with a few COVID-related changes.

- 1. You must be fully vaccinated in order to participate.
- 2. You must call or text me to sign up. There can be only four quilters (2 at each table) plus myself in the Bouton Room at a time. I'll need to know in advance if you wish to attend.
- 3. The time has been changed from Mondays, 2-4 to Mondays 1-3, beginning May 3rd.
- 4. All needles, scissors, threaders, etc. will be sanitized and packaged individually.
- No snacks or drinks can be served. You're welcome to bring your own beverage, if you chose.

For those not familiar with the "My Brother's Keeper" (a/k/a "Ugly Quilts") quilting group, allow me to explain. This is a nationwide mission started years ago by Flo Wheatley from Hop Bottom, PA where donations of scrap materials,

blankets, sheets, etc. are sewn into 7'x7' squares filled with even warmer materials. They are then turned into sleeping bags filled with miscellaneous items, such as soaps, shampoo, tooth brushes, paste, socks, hats and scarves and tied with donated neckties. When complete, they are delivered to City Church for distribution to the homeless. In just two years, we have completed 45 sleeping bags!

A group of us have met weekly since February 2018 until COVID hit last March. We talk, laugh, (previously) snacked, coffee'd and most importantly, required NO SEWING ABILITY!! All you need do is tie some knots with needle and thread. It's honestly a great two hours of fellowship while providing warmth and prayers to our homeless community.

We proudly accept EBT/SNAP benefits. Each week we provide member education for our members so that you know what it is in your share and how to store and cook what you're getting!

Payments and Discounts

VINES Farm Share is open to families of all income levels. We accept cash, check, EBT/SNAP, credit card, and FVRx Vouchers. In an effort to make healthy food affordable to all families, VINES Farm Share offers a 25%, 50% or 75% discount on shares to memers who fall within our income eligibility guidelines.

Why should I sign up for VINES Farm Share? Because it's awesome! You'll eat good food, save money, receive weekly tips, support local farmers and have fun doing it!

NOTE: We are a new location on the Eastside for pickup. Wednesdays 3-5PM STARTING Mid-June to the end of October.

A sign-up paper is in the narthex or you can call the office to volunteer. Please consider volunteering for this community outreach project.

The "soup give away" at the corner was a big hit. Thanks to all who helped with this.

The "winter clothesline" has been taken down until the cold weather season returns! It was well received by many. Thanks to all who donated scarves, hats, gloves, mittens, masks and other miscellaneous items.

We have found out from Food Bank of the Southern Tier that we can give food to the Rescue Mission as long as we don't cook it for them or charge them. They have been struggling due to the pandemic.

We still want to pursue a "diaper bank" on the Eastside. We need to solicit different stores (i.e. Walmart, Sam's Club, \$\$ stores, etc) Also, we need to approach other churches to assist in this project. And, of course, individual donations will be needed. Pastor Bryant Clark's wife, Kristina, has been very helpful in giving us ideas for starting this project.

We have been asked to help contact people who have not been attending church for a while. I think of the old song that said, "Reach out and touch somebody". (I am certainly dating myself.) During this time, we need to do that --- Reach Out!

The committee will be planning for the fall Sunday School Program in the upcoming weeks and if you feel you would like to be involved in these efforts please contact the church office to let us know.



FINANCIAL UPDATE

The year 2020 was an unusual year in many ways, so it probably is no surprise that financially speaking it was unusual for Fairview Church as well. Some expenses were lower than anticipated such as the heating bill due to the church building being closed for several months. At the same time income was lower than expected also due to the church building being closed. At the end of the year when all of the expenses and revenue were added up we had spent \$60.00 more than the revenue that was received, very close to a break even year! Considering the circumstances the end result was surprising.

There are a couple of items that stand out from 2020. The first of note is that our church participated in the federal payroll protection program (PPP for short). You may have heard about this program in the news last year. A part of the federal support for non-profit entities last year allowed our church to "borrow" about \$21,000 utilizing this program. By using the borrowed money to pay specified items such as for payroll costs the "borrowed" amount was forgiven. Without this PPP program we would have experienced a year end shortfall much greater than the above noted \$60.00.

The second item of note is that we were short of paying our church's share of ministry shares by more than \$10,000. Unfortunately, we were not able to fund our share of the Conference's work locally and around the world.

Turning to the current year, as we completed the budget process for 2021 we realized that we had a significant budget deficit. A smaller number of persons completed a pledge for the current year and the amount pledged was less than the previous year. Thus, our anticipated income for 2021 is less than in 2020. A check of the actual results of the first three months of 2021 finds that expenses to complete our church's ministry exceeded income by \$1400.00. On the plus side we were able to secure another PPP load for 2021 which will be used for specified expenses during the year.

There are many challenges ahead for our church this year and one of those challenges will be to fund the ministry of our church in our community and beyond. You can assist with this challenge in a variety of ways. On May 22 we will have a chicken BBQ to raise money for the programs of the church, dinners will be sold for \$10.00. You can stop by to pick up a meal to take home to enjoy. If you have not made a pledge for 2021 you can still complete a pledge and fulfill that pledge over the course of the year. One time giving donations can be mailed to the church or made on line from the Church's web site (https://fairviewumcbinghamton.wordpress.com/). From the web site click on "About Fairview" then choose "Opportunities for Giving" and follow the steps to complete your donation.
